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The Pastor's Corner

A day after the shooting in San Bernardino that left 14 people dead, The New York Daily Times released a paper with the cover title, "God Isn't Fixing This." The subtitle read, "As the latest batch of innocent Americans are left lying in pools of blood, cowards who could truly end gun scourge continue to hide behind meaningless platitudes." Alongside the title were pictures of quotes from some of our presidential candidate's twitter accounts. The quotes pictured on the cover are listed below (I didn't feel the need to cite which candidates, because it's not relevant to the point):

"My thoughts and prayers are with the victims, families, and brave first responders during this unspeakable tragedy."

"Thoughts & prayers are with San Bernardino."

"We are all thinking about what happened in California today. Please keep the victims & their families in your prayers."

"Our prayers are with the victims, their families, and the first responders in San Bernardino who willingly go into harm's way to save others."

On one hand, sometimes people just say what they think others want to hear. In Matthew 6, Jesus even talked about the Pharisees who loved to pray long prayers just to be heard. Furthermore, Christ also told a story of a self-righteous man who went to the temple, and implied that the man's prayer wasn't heard. So maybe the editor of **The Daily Times** thought these were just empty words from politicians who didn't really care. More likely, however, is that he simply didn't agree with their political positions. But even then, at least these quotes were expressing empathy! I think it's quite strange for anyone to be upset over public

expressions of care and concern, especially a newspaper editor. It's natural to pray when there is a loss of life. Most of us do it quite often. Someone passes away, and coworkers sign cards, usually expressing "thoughts & prayers" to the remaining family members. And yet there are now people in our culture who find this offensive.

Regardless whether you're a registered Democrat or Republican; regardless whether you're for or against gun control...to call prayers "meaningless platitudes" is very dangerous! The gist of the newspaper's "God Isn't Fixing This" message is, "We don't need God, we need action." And this can be seen in the Twitter comments, as some of the more popular responses to the quotes in the article were, "We need more than your prayers", and "We need to fix this ourselves."

The Bible records a similar story about a bunch of people who wanted action. They were afraid that they might be attacked by an enemy and scattered. So they decided to fix the problem themselves. They began to build a tower. It was designed to be something they could rally around, and no one would be able to scatter them - or so they thought. The story is from Genesis 11, and the tower was called Babel. God scattered them by confusing their speech. Their action couldn't thwart God's will.

Now what about the phrase "God Isn't Fixing This"? It's true that God doesn't always answer our prayers in the way that we'd like or expect; but this doesn't always mean that they weren't heard! Take the story of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. When faced with the choice of putting their trust in Nebuchadnezzar (the leader of their government at (continued on back of this page)

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the time), or God...they chose God, even when threatened with a fiery death. How did the three respond? They said, "The God whom we serve is able to save us, but even if he doesn't, we want to make it clear that we will never worship the golden statue that you set up." (Daniel 3:17-18).

The same three Hebrews also had a friend named Daniel. When faced with the option of praying to God or trusting the actions of the government, Daniel chose to pray. He ended up in the Lion's Den...but God worked it out in the end. He still does the same for us, whether we're delivered in this life, or the next. God still wins in the end, and He has already dealt with our world's problem of sin. He has already fixed it! Sadly, some haven't chosen to accept the solution.
