The Pastor's Corner

I'd like to begin this month by looking at a piece of advice Moses received from his father-in-law, Jethro. It's found in Exodus 18:13-23.

"13 The next day, Moses took his seat to hear the people's disputes against each other. They waited before him from morning till evening. 14 When Moses' father-in-law saw all that Moses was doing for the people, he asked, "What are you really accomplishing here? Why are you trying to do all this alone while everyone stands around you from morning till evening?"15 Moses replied, "Because the people come to me to get a ruling from God. 16 When a dispute arises. they come to me, and I am the one who settles the case between the quarreling parties. I inform the people of God's decrees and give them his instructions." 17 "This is not good!" Moses' father-in-law exclaimed. 18 "You're going to wear yourself out-and the people, too. This job is too heavy a burden for you to handle all by yourself. 19 Now listen to me, and let me give you a word of advice, and may God be with you. You should continue to be the people's representative before God, bringing their disputes to him. 20 Teach them God's decrees, and give them his instructions. Show them how to conduct their lives. 21 But select from all the people some capable, honest men who fear God and hate bribes. Appoint them as leaders over groups of one thousand, one hundred, fifty, and ten. 22 They should always be available to solve the people's common disputes, but have them bring the major cases to you. Let the leaders decide the smaller matters themselves. They will help you carry the load, making the task easier for you. 23 If you follow this advice, and if God commands you to do so, then you will be able to endure the pressures, and all these people will go home in peace." Ex 18:13-23 (NLT)

Even Godly leaders can't do everything by themselves. Systems of government are helpful and necessary. But we live in a fallen world, and just like everyone else, politicians can become corrupted.

In our country, the primary election season has already begun. Candidates are debating and putting out ads, and someone has already asked me who I thought was the best candidate. I'm not sure! We are just in the beginning of the primaries. But the bigger question is this, "What is our responsibility as a Christian when it comes to voting?"

Political questions like these have always been a challenge for religious leaders. In the Bible, even the Pharisees tried to trick Jesus with a political question. They asked Him a question about taxes, and whether it was right to pay them. How did Jesus respond? We can see his response in Matthew 22:18-21,

18 But Jesus knew their evil motives. "You hypocrites!" he said. "Why are you trying to trap me? 19 Here, show me the coin used for the tax." When they handed him a Roman coin, 20 he asked, "Whose picture and title are stamped on it?" Caesar's," they replied. "Well, then," he said, "give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and give to God what belongs to God." Matt 22:18-21 (NLT)

Jesus simply said, "Give the government what is theirs, and give God what is His." In other words, fulfill your responsibilities as a citizen of your earthly country, and at the same time, fulfill your responsibilities as a child of God.

So what does that mean when it comes to voting? How should we select a candidate? I want us to look at another section of scripture in the Bible, when God called his prophet Samuel to anoint Saul's successor as King of Israel,

1 Now the LORD said to Samuel, "You have mourned long enough for Saul. I have rejected him as king of Israel, so fill your flask with olive oil and go to Bethlehem. Find a man named Jesse who lives there, for I have selected one of his sons to be my king."2 But Samuel asked, "How can I do that? If Saul hears about it, he will kill me." "Take a heifer with you," the LORD replied, "and say that you have come to make a sacrifice to the LORD. 3 Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you which of his sons to anoint for me."4 So Samuel did as the LORD instructed. When he arrived at Bethlehem, the elders of the town came trembling to meet him. "What's wrong?" they asked. "Do you come in peace?"5 "Yes," Samuel replied. "I have come to sacrifice to the LORD. Purify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice." Then Samuel performed the purification rite for Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice, too. 6 When they arrived, Samuel took one look at Eliab and thought, "Surely this is the LORD's anointed!" But the LORD said to Samuel, "Don't judge by his appearance or height, for I have rejected him. The LORD doesn't see things the way you see them. People judge by outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart." 1 Sam 16:1-7 (NLT)

Here, we see that as soon as Samuel saw Eliab... Eliab had his vote. But what did God say? God said, "Don't judge by his appearance or height...the Lord looks at the heart."

Combine this advice from God to Saul with Jethro's advice given to Moses, and what do you have?

"Select from all the people some capable, honest men who fear God and hate bribes, and don't judge by outward appearance...look at their hearts."

Ideally, God would have us look to vote for competent and caring Christians. The 1st chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, John Jay, put it this way: "It is the duty, as well as the privilege and interest of our Christian nation, to select and prefer Christians for our rulers".

However, we live in a fallen world; we live in a democracy, and no candidate is perfect. We have to recognize this, and this is why the lack of a candidate that fulfills all of our hopes and perceptions is not a valid reason for us not to vote.

Furthermore, we have to realize that not everyone who says they're a Christian truly follows Christ. And even then, not everyone who truly follows Christ has the background and experience to make a good leader. Martin Luther once put it this way, he said, "I would rather be ruled by a competent Turk, than an incompetent Christian."

Therefore, voting requires discernment. It's not about which candidate has the personality that we like the best, which is the best looking, or which is the most like us. Instead, we are called to be thoughtful about the process, and vote for leaders of quality, character, and competence.
